



HIERARCHY OF VACCINES

BEST: Those developed using no fetal cell lines NEXT BEST: Those that used cell lines during testing and research but not in production of vaccine itself LEAST: Those using cell lines throughout process up to and including vaccine production.

COOPERATION WITH EVIL

LEVELS FROM FORMAL TO REMOTE

Producers of vaccines have most culpability (Formal)
Distributors have some culpability (Formal or Material)
Those taking the vaccine have very little (remote)





CURRENT VACCINES APPROVED

ONLY TWO PFIZER AND MODERNA

Neither uses cell lines in manufacture of vaccine.
but both used pre-existing stem cell lines traced back
to the 1970's & 80's to confirm their research. This
places them in NEXT BEST category above.

USE OF THESE VACCINES

FOR THE GENERAL PUBLIC RECEIVING THE VACCINE AMOUNTS TO REMOTE COOPERATION THAT IS ACCEPTABLE BECAUSE OF THE GREAT DANGER TO PERSONAL OR PUBLIC HEALTH



USE OF OTHER VACCINES DEVELOPED LATER WOULD NEED TO BE EVALUATED ON THEIR OWN MERITS

Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith: DIGNATUS PERSONAE 35:3

"Grave reasons may be morally proportionate to justify the use of such "biological material". Thus, for example, danger to the health of children could permit parents to use a vaccine which was developed using cell lines of illicit origin, while keeping in mind that everyone has the duty to make known their disagreement and to ask that their healthcare system make other types of vaccines available. Moreover, in organizations where cell lines of illicit origin are being utilized, the responsibility of those who make the decision to use them is not the same as that of those who have no voice in such a decision.
